Morgantown North Rotary Associate Membership

Morgantown North is trying several new approaches to membership, one of which is the institution of an associate member category. After careful consideration, we decided to offer this to a select few, hand-chosen people who can bring something of value to the club, but may not yet be ready for full membership.

I'm happy to report that on January 10, we brought in our first two associate members, and they seem to be as excited as we are. They are already active in the community, and well-positioned in their professions to help us with projects.

Here are the parameters we set up. An associate member pays \$40 in dues per quarter which covers their RI, district and club dues. They are legitimate members. We pay a set food cost for a buffet (included in our quarterly bills), but they simply pay \$5.00 when they attend a meeting. That's less than the actual food cost, but our goal was to keep it as affordable as possible, and we always have extra food.

Associate members have no voting rights and cannot hold office. We do not solicit them for Paul Harris contributions. However, we ask that they be active members, especially with our projects.

Associate membership is offered for a two-year period, at which time we hope they can move to a full membership.

And, here's one very important element. We made it very clear that current members could not opt to be associate members. You can move up, but you can't move down.

Our goal for next year is to provide all 400+ students with warm coats.

We provided a Christmas party for 37 foster children who have been taken from their homes for either, neglect or abuse and provided them with clothes and toys. The party was held at the Goshen Baptist church, they had a wonderful dinner provided by the Staff at Sundale Nursing Home, and then who appeared from the North Pole was none other than Mr. and Mrs. Santa Clause. Our club has provided for children during the holiday for many years and when you see those little faces light up with the hope and cheer that is provided that day, it is worth doing it repeatedly.

We also provided mattresses, and a microwave for a family at Scotts Run, along with clothes, a tablet, an X box, a bicycle and a scooter. Sometimes we don't think about all the needs we have in our communities until the spirit of the holiday opens our hearts and minds.

The club was able to donate to the Empty Bowls program, the local soup kitchen and to the Newburg fire department to help with a generator, for those times when the community is without heat or electric.

Dave Raese teamed up with WVU hearing center to start a hearing aid foundation, it is called the Hugh Lindsay Hearing Aid Foundation in memory of Dr. Lindsay for his years of collecting hearing aids and his dedication to finding ways to provide hearing aids for those who are not able to afford to hear. Dr. Lindsay was a long time Rotarian who dedicated his time and energy to many Rotary projects.

The Friends of Decker's Creek approached the club for cleanup along the trail in Sabraton, several Rotarians came out to help with that event and the club joined the foundation with a donation and commitment to continue efforts to clean up along the Decker's Creek area in Morgantown, along with beautifying the area with benches.

We have filled back packs at the Scotts Run Settlement House for the local schools and helped prepare area seniors homes and yards for the winter. Our club tries to stay busy and help our community as much as possible.

Country Club. The two clubs set a goal of raising \$750 to contribute to the fight to eradicate


polio.

Rotary Club of Parkersburg president, Jill Parsons was happy to report that the two clubs raised a total of \$1,150, with more contributions still coming in by other club members who weren't able to attend the event.

Stacy DeCicco, Rotary Club of Parkersburg member who is director of the United Way Alliance of the Mid-Ohio Valley, shared a new on-line giving portal that allows attendees to see in real time how contributions add up at an event compared to a goal. The two clubs used the portal and could see the "thermometer" racing for the goal of \$750 as attendees arrived and their donations were captured.

Imagine the excitement when the projected goal was within a few dollars, then the upward momentum of the thermometer as the clubs surpassed it!

Once submitted to Rotary International, the donations will be matched 2:1 by the <u>Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation</u>, which means at least \$3,450 will go toward the fight to eradicate polio from the Wood County and Parkersburg clubs!

DuPont and Parkersburg Rotary Team-Up in Drug Free Schools Effort

PARKERSBURG, W.VA. — Dow-DuPont Washington Works employees and the Parkersburg Rotary Club teamed-up at Parkersburg South High School to enroll 150 students in the initial first testing day for the Drug Free Schools of America (DFCA) initiative.

"This was a very successful first test day at Parkersburg South because of the school's dedicated staff and the volunteers" said Bob Newell, DFCA Program Chair for Rotary and Co-chair of the Parkersburg Area Drug Free Community Coalition. "The program is not about catching students using drugs, it's about creating a drug free attitude that will stay with them after graduation and into adulthood."

Thus far, the Rotary sponsored Drug Free Schools effort has received widespread support from area businesses and community organizations including charitable donations to offset program expenses. Parkersburg and Williamstown High Schools are also sponsoring similar efforts to prevent drug use among students.

Drug Free Clubs of America is a voluntary program established in 2005, in which high school students with parental permission submit to voluntary drug testing. In all, nine high schools in West Virginia are participating in DFCA.

Drug Free Clubs of America is designed as a "full circle" approach to drug prevention. The strategy surrounds every different type of student with protection throughout their day. On test day, students are often surprised to learn that their membership in DFCA is something they now have in common with others to which they never felt similar. By bringing together school, parent, and community efforts, members benefit from an overall positive sense of belonging regardless if they are at school, at home, or out enjoying their community.

Newell emphasized that students can still join the club and applications are still being accepted. John Golebiewski, Vice Principal at PSHS is the schools liaison for the DFCA Chapter.

Parkersburg Rotary Club Delivers 80 Pairs of "Shoe that Grows" to Zimbabwe Orphanage

When Parkersburg Rotarian Andy Hartleben returned from Rotary International's Annual Conference held in Atlanta this past June, he came away with many ideas on how to amplify Rotary's global mission with the help of his fellow club members. In August, Hartleben explained to the club that he wanted to raise \$2,500 to send 80 pairs of a "Shoe That Grows" to an impoverished country where kids need it most. Fellow Rotarian Jeff Matheny stepped up to the challenge by hand delivering the shoes in person during an October trip to the Fairfield Children's Home, an orphanage in Zimbabwe. Matheny's previous humanitarian visits to Zimbabwe, and an already established relationship with the orphanage, made this project a *perfect fit*.

The Shoe That Grows, is a sandal invented in 2008 by Kenton Lee that can adjust its size, allowing children in impoverished countries to grow up without having to go barefoot. Because of their unique expandable design he shoes can grow 5 sizes and last at least 5 years.

"The trip to Atlanta opened my eyes as to the various needs around the world, while at the same time, realizing there are workable solutions that we as Rotarians here locally, can impact lives globally," stated Harleben.

According to the shoe's manufacturer, Because International, "There are over 300 million children who do not have shoes. And countless more with shoes that do not fit." Children without shoes are susceptible to injuries and parasites that infect humans through their feet. The problem with traditional shoe donations is that they are soon outgrown, which is exactly the problem that these new shoes would fix.

"This service opportunity has been tugging at my heart since the Atlanta trip. I instantly realized how much I take for granted with my own children. I am genuinely honored to be a part of a club that truly believes in the Rotary motto of *Service Above Self*," Hartleben added.
